

Weekly Devotion Sunday, November 15, 2020

Triumph is just UMPH added to try. —Anon.

In 1763, a child was born in Germany near Heidelberg to Johann and Marie. He was the youngest kid in a family of four boys. As a child, he worked in his father's butcher shop, and he also sold milk.

When he was 16, he joined his brother George in London, working in his uncle's flute and piano factory. While there, he learned to speak English.

In 1784, after the American Revolution, John, as he now called himself, left London for New York City. He intended to work with Henry, another brother who had established a butcher shop in the city. But purely by accident, he bumped into a fellow who was dealing in furs. One thing led to another and by the late 1780s, young John had a

flourishing fur shop and was selling at a great profit to stores in London and elsewhere.

And that's how John Jacob Astor founded what would become one of the storied families of America's history. Astor was the scion of the fur trade for many years. But later in life, he diversified his interests and began to make considerable sums of money in New York real estate. And here is a story about one such transaction.

One day, Astor sold a lot near Wall Street for \$8,000. The buyer, confident that he had outsmarted Astor, could not resist a little self-congratulations after the signing of the papers. "Why, in a few years, this lot will be worth \$12,000," he gloated.

"True," said Astor, "but with your \$8,000, I will buy 80 lots above Canal Street, and by the time your lot's worth \$12,000, my 80 lots will be worth \$80,000. (There are a number of versions about this story of Astor's real estate dealings, perhaps apocryphal, but it was accepted as true during his lifetime.)

In today's Bible reading from Matthew 25, Jesus tells the story of a master who gave three servants some money to invest. Two of the servants were very much like John Astor of our story. They made a lot of money. They gave it to their lord. The master was pleased. But the third servant simply held on to his master's money. He didn't lose any money, but he didn't earn any either. The master was not pleased.

God has given us, like the master gave his servants, some investment capital. It might be different from person to person "according to the grace given to us," says the apostle Paul in Romans 12:6.

Let's thank God that we are trusted with God's work in the world. Let

us use every gift God has given us to increase the work on God on earth. Our Lord and Master will be pleased!
